FMAS is an academic workshop presenting current research in applying Formal Methods to Autonomous Systems. The goals of this workshop are to bring together leading researchers in autonomy and formal methods to present recent and ongoing work, including experience reports and case studies as well as identify future directions for this emerging application of formal methods. This workshop is concerned with the use of formal methods to specify, model, or verify autonomous or robotic systems, in whole or in part. Submissions may focus on case studies that identify the challenges for formal methods in this area, or experience reports that provide guidelines for tackling these challenges.

HAS IRELAND FAILED THE COVID-19 TEST?

BOOK ONLINE

In this talk Professor Mark Boyle, Department of Geography and Social Sciences Institute (MUSSI), will address three key questions: On the basis of which metrics can we say that Ireland has failed the COVID-19 test? Why has Ireland failed the COVID-19 test? What does failure tell us about what the Irish government needs to fix if we are to build back better?

Dr Camilla Fitzsimons will talk about extensive research she did over three years that focused on the before and after of the 2018 repeal activists. Rather than approach high profile figures, her research is from the bottom up and is based on engagement with over 400 activists canvassing for repeal. As well as sharing some findings, she will talk about the challenges of being an activist and an academic and the importance of activist-research as part of social justice movements.

TRANSPORT PLANNING IN THE AGE OF CLIMATE CHANGE: LEVERAGING OPEN SPATIAL DATA

JOIN ONLINE

Dr Kevin Credit is an Assistant Professor in the National Centre for Geocomputation at Maynooth University. This talk discusses a new method to dynamically model urban passenger mode trade-offs at fine-grained spatial and temporal scales using open spatial routing data available from sources like OpenTripPlanner (OTP). This approach can be used to calculate dynamic modal trade-offs for specific times, routes, and geographic areas of interest, providing a framework for creating mode choice profiles for individual cities and neighbourhoods. Importantly, it is a resource that can be used by planners to better understand how to foster the use of non-auto travel modes, which is a crucial component of achieving urban sustainability goals in the age of climate change. The talk demonstrates uses of the dynamic mode choice framework to explore structural inequities in mobility for various demographic groups in Chicago as well as international comparison of transportation mode profiles between European and North American cities.

Accurate citation in keeping with the norms of your discipline and avoiding plagiarism are an essential part of research integrity. To aid you in this process MU provides access to the Desktop and Online versions of the EndNote Reference Management Tool. This talk will bring you through the set-up process and explain the basic functionality of EndNote. At the end of the session, you will be able to set up your own account, populate it with references, sort them into subject groups, and generate bibliographies and in text citations/footnotes from your references.

DIGITAL HUMANITIES AND OGHAM AND LATINATE INSCRIPTIONS FROM EARLY MEDIEVAL TIMES TO THE PRESENT

Dr Nora White, Department of Early Irish, will talk about two projects currently being undertaken in the department researching the earliest surviving writing in Irish.

The first project, EMILI (Early Medieval Irish Latinate Inscriptions; funded by a Royal Irish Academy Nowlan Digitisation grant) aims to initiate a searchable digital corpus of early medieval Irish inscriptions in the Latin script. The second project, OG(H)AM (Harnessing digital technologies to transform understanding of ogham writing, from the 4th century to the 21st) is a collaboration between Professor David Stifter at Maynooth University and Professor Katherine Forsyth at Glasgow University that was recently awarded funding through the joint Irish Research Council and the Arts and Humanities Research Council in the Digital Humanities scheme. This project is based on the earlier Irish Ogham in 3D project at the Dublin Institute for Advanced Studies, but will broaden the scope to include examples of Ogham from Britain, on materials other than stone and from periods after the initial early medieval phase of the use of this enigmatic script.

MIT CINCS (COMMUNICATIONS INFORMATION NETWORKS CIRCUITS AND SIGNALS)/HAMILTON INSTITUTE SEMINAR

Professor Paul Patras, University of Edinburgh, "Making Sense of Mobile Network Traffic using Deep Learning" Accurate understanding of mobile network traffic at city scale is increasingly important for precision network engineering,

demand-aware allocation of compute resources, and security. Gaining such knowledge is however difficult, because it requires large-scale measurement collection using dedicated equipment, substantial storage capabilities, and non-trivial post-processing. In this talk I will first make the case for harnessing the power of deep learning to obtain highly-accurate real-time mobile traffic analytics that can fuel the management of 5G networks. I will then show how machine learning can be used in a principled way to detect network threats in their infancy and how to build such detection systems with a view to deployment at the edge.

Honora Faul, Assistant Keeper (Published Collections), National Library of Ireland and Dr Christoph Schmidt-**BOOK ONLINE** Supprian, Acting Keeper (Collection Management), The Library of Trinity College Dublin, the University of Dublin.

> Irish Legislation extending legal deposit to digital publications was commenced in December 2019 - Copyright and Other Intellectual Property Law Provisions Act 2019: Amendment of section 198 of Principal Act. The National Library and the other Irish Copyright Libraries, including Maynooth University Library, have since been entitled to collect copies of digital publications from Irish publishers free of charge, just like they are doing with print publications. But so far none have done so, at least not systematically. The presenters will consider the implications of the new Copyright Act 2019, outline the current landscape of digital publications in Ireland, point to some related initiatives in the National Library and in the Library of Trinity College Dublin, and finally explore some options for how systematic collection of digital legal deposit publications could be implemented.

11AM-12PM WAKING THE HIRSCHFELD: AN ORAL HISTORY AND ARCHIVAL STUDY OF A DUBLIN LGBTQ CENTRE

Dr Páraic Kerrigan (UCD) and Professor Maria Pramaggiore (MU) JOIN ONLINE Dr Kerrigan and Professor Pramaggiore present their current research project, which combines oral history and archival

research in order to re-discover the rich history of an LGBTQ community resource which operated from 1979-1987. We argue that oral history, archival research and a clearly articulated concept of intergenerational collaboration is essential to the ability of researchers to mark and historicise the discontinuities of queer Irish lives.

12PM-1PM **EQUALITY, DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION IN RESEARCH AT MAYNOOTH UNIVERSITY**
