SECTION 1

SHAPING YOUR DEGREE

The Bachelor of Arts degree offers choice and flexibility. You can choose subjects that suit you best and that interest you most. That's not to say that there are no limits to your choices. No matter what subjects you select, you are expected to meet our high standards.

As much as possible however, we let you decide although you don't have to decide everything at once. You can take up to four subjects in first year and take time to decide what subject combination is right for you.

In first year, you can also change your mind in the first four weeks of semester 1. During those first four weeks, you can choose an alternative subject if you feel your first selection was not right for you. You can also make some changes to your choices at the start of semester 2.

When you progress to second year, you can decide the structure of your degree based on your particular selection of subjects, and your results from first year.

Most students take a two-subject degree from second year - we call this a 'Double Major'. However, perhaps you would prefer to specialise in one subject with less of another (known as a 'Major with Minor') or take just one subject (called a 'Single Major').



CRITICAL SKILLS

In first year, you also have the option of taking a subject called Critical Skills. This is an intensive course, available in first year only, that develops the skills we want all Maynooth graduates to have. This course will develop your ability to analyse ideas from different perspectives, to develop your own position and to present your ideas clearly and convincingly.

Critical Skills are available in every timetable group in first year. They are taught in small groups and you can expect to do regular assignments in writing and in verbal presentation which will develop your skills in these important areas (See Section 2 for more detail).

GLOSSARY OF KEY TERMS

Code: As you know, the CAO code for the Bachelor of Arts programme at Maynooth University is MH101. When you register online, you will start to notice the code 'ARTS' instead of MH101. ARTS is the code we use in our systems for MH101. You can expect to see ARTS when you register online and in documentation related to your degree, for example, a printout of your registration record or your first year results.

Semester: We divide the academic year into two parts called 'semesters'. Semester 1 runs from September to January and semester 2 runs from February to May.

Programme: The 'programme' is the general term we use to describe what you study. Your programme leads to a degree and the content will depend on the degree you are registered to.

Subject: Many programmes are divided into different 'subjects'. For example, Business (Management), Geography, English and Sociology. In most degrees, you will graduate in either one or two subjects although it's very normal to take more subjects than this in first year. **Module**: Subjects are made up of 'modules'. Each module represents a chunk of work and is a substantial amount of study. Every module is assessed separately and together, your different modules contribute to an overall subject mark for each subject you're registered to.

Credits: The amount of work involved in a module is indicated by its credit weight. In first year, most modules are 7.5 credits. After first year, most modules are either 5 or 10 credits.

Maynooth University uses the European Credit Transfer System (ECTS). In this system, a normal year of full time study for the majority of undergraduate programmes is 60 credits.

In first year you will typically register for, and complete eight modules; four in semester 1 and four in semester 2.

Marks and Standards: The regulations that guide university assessment are called Marks and Standards. The full Marks and Standards document, plus a guide for students on assessment regulations are available on the University Policies page on the main Maynooth University website.

REGISTRATION

It's very important that you are registered for all the modules you are taking. If you are not registered for a module in our registration system, you will not be earning credits for that module and building towards your degree. All students register online at the start of each academic year. In first year we allow you to make changes to your registration up to the end of the fourth week of semester 1. This is to give you time to sample different subjects and to make sure you have made the right choices. It's important to remember that all subjects are taught from Day 1 (i.e. the first day of lectures) and so the later you leave it to firm up your choices, the more of a subject you may miss. Our advice is to go to the Welcome Week subject talks. Going to the subject talks is crucial to getting started on the right foot.

In first year, you have a lot of subjects to choose from. After first year, you will have the opportunity to make a lot of choices within your subjects.




Check your subjects on the online CourseFinder tool and you will notice that modules within a subject have different indicators. These are:

Compulsory:you must take that module in that subjectOptional:it is one of a choice of modules in that subjectRequired:you must pass that module without compensation

More information about the principle of compensation can be found in the rules that guide grading and assessement. The title of these rules is 'Marks and Standards' and throughout your studies, you will hear reference to Marks and Standards.

AMENDING YOUR REGISTRATION

You can make changes to your subject choices during the first four weeks of semester 1. You will do this online, via the Student Web.

Second semester amendments

In some subjects, if you initially registered for 15 credits, you may be able to take up an additional 7.5 credit module of that subject in semester 2. Of course, this would mean you have to discontinue 7.5 credits in one of your other subjects.

We have included a note on subjects that offer this semester 2 amendment possibility, including if it's a change you can make yourself online or if written permission is required. Remember, amending your subjects in semester 2 impacts what subjects you can progress with to second year. It's a serious step and amending your subject selection in semester 2 is not something you should do without taking advice first.

INTENTION TO TRANSFER AFTER FIRST YEAR

Some students register for ARTS but intend transferring to another programme in second year. Where there is a transfer possibility in second year, this is listed in the right side column of the subject tables that follow. If you want to maximise your registration choices in second year, it is important that you read the information in the right side column before making your first year registration selection.

If you have the stated criteria for transfer, when you register online for second year, you will be offered:

- 1. second year ARTS, including all pathways you meet the criteria for. Remember that pathways are: double major, major with minor, minor and single major.
- 2. second year of the transfer programme(s).

It will be your decision which option to choose.

YOUR FIRST YEAR CHOICES

Most ARTS students take two subjects from second year to degree level but in some subjects, there is a Single Major available if you want to specialise in one subject from second year.

In first year you can use your options to explore a range of subjects or to specialise in the subjects that interest you most. You can use this choice to find out what best suits you and to build a range of skills and expertise for your future. You can check the online CourseFinder tool on the Maynooth University website, in the prospectus and on department websites for details of what you can study in first year. Subject presentation information is on the Orientation website at <u>https://my.maynoothuniversity.ie/</u> as well as other key resources to help you transition to university.

You can also speak to the Programme Advisory Office about your options within ARTS. Staff from the Programme Advisory Office will be available during Welcome Week and throughout your time at Maynooth University.

Research your options before, and during Welcome Week and most importantly, before you press that online registration button.

Different subject combinations available to you in first year (remember, ARTS students register for 60 credits each year)		
4 subjects (4 x 15 credits)	This allows you to study the greatest range of subjects and decide which you prefer.	
3 subjects and Critical Skills (4 x 15 credits)	This allows you to take a range of subjects and also to take Critical Skills.	
A double subject and two others (1 x 30 credits and 2 x 15 credits)	This allows you to take three subjects but to devote half of your time to one subject.	
A double subject, one other subject and Critical Skills (1 x 30 credits and 2 x 15 credits)	This allows you to take two subjects along with Critical Skills.	
Two double subjects (2 x 30 credits)	This allows you to take just two subjects.	

COMBINATIONS OF SUBJECTS YOU CAN CHOOSE



Subjects are organised into timetable groups. The subjects in each group are scheduled at the same times and it is not possible to take more than one subject from any group. The table on the next page shows the timetable groups. You can take any combination as long as there is no timetable clash.

Notes

1.

Subjects available as 'double subjects' (30 credits) are marked with an asterisk*. These subjects need extra class times and the extra class times are normally scheduled in Groups 6 or 7. Where the extra credits are timetabled in a different group, we have marked this on the table.

2.

French, German, Spanish and Chinese Studies offer a 30 credit first year option for beginners in the language and are marked with #. Chinese Studies is only available as a 30 credit Beginner option.

For those who have previously studied French, German or Spanish, a 15 credit Non-Beginner option is available. You must take the 30 credit option if you are a Beginner in French, German or Spanish. If you have the recommended minimum entry requirement, you should take the 15 credit option in French, German or Spanish.

SECTION 2

CRITICAL SKILLS

Today's university graduates face unprecedented and complex challenges. Emerging technologies, climate change, international conflict, and threats to democracy require a curriculum that equips students with the skills to understand, analyse, and address critical issues.

Maynooth graduates will have to be able to deal with complex arguments, work as part of a team, produce digital content, evaluate evidence and make balanced judgements, and communicate complex ideas clearly, both verbally and in writing. We regard these skills as critical for a university education. They are also skills that are highly valued by today's employers.



Because these skills are so important in university and beyond, Maynooth University offers a specially designed foundation course for first year students in 'Universal Critical Skills.' Critical Skills equips students with essential skills for active citizenship and lifelong learning.

Critical Skills is also designed to help you succeed at university. Entering university is a major change in a student's life and Critical Skills is designed to equip you with the confidence and skills to succeed at university. The classes are small which facilitates peer-group formation and instructor support. Critical Skills will equip you with writing, research, and public speaking skills to support your learning in all your classes.

The first year Critical Skills courses are a 15-credit option and you can choose to take a Critical Skills course as one of your credit-bearing courses in first year. It will involve small group sessions every week, which will give you an opportunity to develop and practice these essential skills right from the outset.

Critical Skills is available in all timetable groups. Critical Skills is interdisciplinary and transferable to the topics you are studying in your other subjects.

SECTION 3

BA INTERNATIONAL (Study Abroad possibilities)

As an ARTS student at Maynooth University, you have the option of studying abroad as part of your degree and earning a BA International. This is a four-year degree programme. You complete two years at Maynooth, study abroad at one of our partner universities in third year and return to Maynooth for your fourth and final year. You don't need to decide right now if you would like to take the BA International – you can make your mind up in second year.

Maynooth University currently has 190 partners in thirty countries on five continents. You can choose to study in another European country through the Erasmus+ programme or take the Study Abroad option and study outside Europe.

Our partner universities include University of Amsterdam,



University of Barcelona, Boston College, University of Kent, University of Miami, University of Montevideo, Nanyang Technological University, University of Notre Dame (AUS), University of Toronto or University of Vienna, to name but a few. www.maynoothuniversity.ie/ international/our-global-partneruniversities. Students going abroad under the Erasmus+ programme are eligible to receive Erasmus funding and students who receive a SUSI maintenance grant are eligible to receive additional Erasmus funding.

Studying abroad has positive effects on students' personal and educational development. It can help you gain confidence and curiosity, develop openness to new experiences and you could study something new or different to what is offered at Maynooth. Students who study abroad also enjoy enhanced employability outcomes. Along with discipline-specific knowledge and skills, employers highly value the transferable skills gained abroad, including intercultural awareness, language skills, adaptability, problem-solving, networking and communication.

You don't need to speak a foreign language to be able to study abroad. Approximately 75% of Maynooth students study abroad through the medium of English in countries where English is not the first language. Depending on which subject(s) you take in your ARTS degree, some partner universities may be more suitable for you than others.

It is important to remember that places on our exchange programmes are competitive. The main criteria for student selection are first year results and subject compatibility.

When you study abroad on an exchange programme, you do not pay tuition fees to your host university although you may be required to pay a small registration or student services fee. You will continue to pay your usual registration fees to MU and you register with MU (as normal).

HOW DO YOU APPLY?

You will be invited to apply for study abroad opportunities early in second year. The International Office holds information sessions, (online and in person), in October each year. Second year students will be invited to attend information sessions, class talks, webinars, student events and one to one meetings with the Mobility Team to discuss their study abroad options.

Studying abroad is enjoyable and challenging. It is a great way to enrich your educational and personal experience, expand your knowledge and intercultural awareness and increase your future employment opportunities. Take this opportunity if you can!

- How do the ARTS timetable groups work?
- Is it possible for me to take a particular combination of subjects?
- I hope to transfer into a Year 2 denominated programme next year; what subjects do I need to take? I have changed my mind about a subject; what should I do now?

Amending your subject choices

At the beginning of the academic year, you will have up to four weeks to change your mind about your subjects. However, we do not recommend that you leave it until week 4 to make up your mind about what subjects to study as you will have missed a lot of content and possibly even some course work. Please contact us if you have any questions about changing your subjects after registration. At the beginning of semester 2, you will have an opportunity to request an amendment to your subject registration. The Programme Advisor discusses all semester 2 subject change requests with students to ensure that you make a fully informed decision.

You will receive an email before the Christmas break with information about the semester 2 subject change process.



A REMINDER OF OUR TERMINOLOGIES

Double Major

You take two subjects to degree level, with equal study of each.

Single Major

You specialise in one subject after first year.

Major with minor

The major takes roughly two thirds of your study after first year and you take a second subject as a minor.


Minor

A minor involves about one third of your time, and is intended for people who are specialising in their major but who also want some expertise in a second subject.

Remember

- Some subjects have minimum entry requirements that you must have in order to study them.
- Other subjects have recommended entry requirements.
- A module that is marked 'required' means that it must be passed by 40% or more (i.e. not by compensation) if you want to proceed to your next year of study in its subject.

ACCOUNTING

FIRST YEAR Subject Codes: AC1F15 AC1V30

Accounting is available as a standard subject (15 credits) or as a double subject (30 credits).

15 credits: Timetable Group 6 30 credits: Timetable Group 6

Recommended minimum entry Leaving Certificate O4/H7 Mathematics

Intention to transfer

Normally, if you intend transferring out of ARTS in second year, you should select the 30 credit Accounting subject at online registration in September.

Please ensure you consult the transfer conditions in the right hand column for the credits required for individual programmes.

Semester 2 amendment

There may be an opportunity to take an additional 7.5 credits of Accounting in semester 2 if you initially registered for the 15 credit option in order to meet transfer conditions to another designated Accounting programme in second year.

SECOND YEAR Progression and Transfer options

Whichever option you choose, you can progress with Accounting within ARTS/MH101 to the following:

• Double major

a) Pass the subject Economics/Finance in first year.

and

b) Pass and achieve an average of at least 60% in the 30 credit Accounting subject.

BBS Business and Accounting (MH407) To transfer you must:

a) Pass a 15 credit Business subject in first year.

b) Pass and achieve an average of at least 60% in the 30 credit Accounting subject.

BCL Law and Accounting (MH502) To transfer you must:

a) Pass Law (30 credits) in first year and

b) Pass and achieve an average at least 60% in the 30 credit Accounting subject.

If you initially selected the 15 credit option, and you particularly like Anthropology, it is permitted to register for an additional 7.5 credits of Anthropology at the beginning of the second semester.

- Double major
- Single major
- Major with minor
- Minor

BBS Business and Global Cultures MH404 To transfer you must:

and
b) Pass all modules in the 15 or 30 credit Anthropology subject.





BUSINESS: 3 STREAMS

FIRST YEAR Subject codes: see below

Business is available as a standard subject (15 credits) or as a double subject (30 credits made up of two Business modules and additional modules in Accounting and Economics).

15 credits: Timetable Group 230 credits: Timetable Groups 2&6

Three streams of Business are available, each with a 15 or 30 credit option. These streams and their subject codes are:

- (i) Business (Management) 15 credits MN1MF15 30 credits MN1MV30
- (ii) Business (Marketing) 15 credits MN1KF15 30 credits MN1KV30
- (iii) Business (International Business) 15 credits MN1IF15 30 credits MN1IV30

Recommended minimum entry (3 streams)

Leaving Certificate (or equivalent) O4/H7 Mathematics

Second semester amendment

If you initially selected the 15 credit option, and you particularly like Business, it is permitted to register for an additional 7.5 credits of the extra Business option (an Economics module) at the beginning of the second semester.

SECOND YEAR Progression and Transfer options

Whichever option you choose, you can progress from any of the three Business streams within ARTS/ MH101 to any of the following:

- Double major
- Major with minor
- Minor

TRANSFER OPTIONS

<u>Single major</u> BBS or BBA programmes To transfer you must:

- Pass all modules in a 30 credit Business subject.
- or

• Pass both modules in a 15 credit Business subject and pass the subject Accounting and pass the subject Economics or Finance.

BBS Business and Accounting MH407 To transfer you must:

 a) Pass a 15 credit Business subject in first year.

b) Have a subject mark of at least 60% in the 30 credit Accounting subject in first year.

BCL Law and Business MH502 To transfer you must:

a) Pass 30 credits of the subject Law andb) Pass 30 credits of a Business subject.

BUSINESS: 3 STREAMS (continued)

FIRST YEAR Subject codes: see across

Intention to transfer

- 1. If you intend transferring out of ARTS in second year to a BBS or BCL degree with Business, you should register for one of the 30 credit Business subjects at online registration in September.
- 2. If you chose the 15 credit option, your transfer options will be more limited although it may be possible to transfer with just 15 credits, depending on your other subjects. Normally, choosing the 15 credit Business option signals that you intend remaining in ARTS for the duration of your programme.

Notes

- 1. If you are planning to become a post-primary teacher of Business, you should take the 30 credit Business (Management) subject to ensure that you can meet Teaching Council requirements.
- 2. 30 credit subjects in Marketing or International Business are not suitable if you are planning to become a post-primary teacher of Business.
- 3. The 30 credit subjects are not suitable for students who are taking the subjects Accounting, Economics or Finance in first year as some modules will be duplicated.
- 4. Normally, only choose the 15 credit option if you intend remaining in ARTS in second year.

SECOND YEAR Progression and Transfer options

TRANSFER OPTIONS (continued)

BBS Business and Global Cultures MH404

To transfer you must:

a) Pass all modules in a 15 or 30 credit Business subject.

and

b) Pass all modules in the 15 or 30 credit Anthropology subject.

BBS Business and Languages MH409 To transfer you must:

a) Pass all modules in a 15 or 30 credit Business subject. and

b) Pass and achieve a subject mark of 40% or more in the 15 or 30 credit language (French, German or Spanish; only the 30 credit option is available in Chinese Studies).

Remember that required modules **must** be passed by 40% or more to progress with the language.



CHINESE STUDIES

FIRST YEAR Subject code: CN1F30

Chinese Studies is available as a standard subject (Beginners only, 30 credits).

30 credits: Timetable Groups 6&7.

Note

Includes one 'required' module meaning that you must pass that module by 40%+ to continue with the subject in Year 2.

Students taking a language are normally expected to travel abroad in Year 3 and transfer to the BA (International) fouryear degree programme. See Section 3 for more detail.

SECOND YEAR Progression and Transfer options

You can progress with Chinese Studies within ARTS/MH101 to either of the following:

- Double major
- Minor

TRANSFER OPTIONS
