Economics as a Stand-Alone Department

Since September 2020, Economics is recognized as an independent stand-alone department following the restructuring of the Department of Economics Finance and Accounting.

Our colleagues in finance and accounting are now housed in the School of Business. We miss the daily chats with the finance and accounting people in the coffee room and in the corridors. But they did not go far, they are just across in the North campus.

The restructuring is a welcome development as the needs and future visions of different fields find better expression under the new structure.

Our existing economics programmes joint with finance and accounting at bachelor's and master's level continue as they are. The administration of these programmes is now performed in collaboration with the Business School.



We are very excited about the introduction of the BSc/MSc Economics Integrated Programme which is aimed at attracting students who aspire to work as professional economists. The Irish market has a strong demand for people who have significant investment in quantitative education beyond the economics core in Arts. Starting from the first year, students will take modules in statistics, econometrics and programming as well as a wide array of economics modules to develop the skills required to critically analyse and interpret economic data. Students who perform at a high enough level in the BSc will be able to automatically continue to the MSc Economics

programme.

The first round of students will enter the programme in September 2022. The MSc Economics Programme will also continue as a stand-alone programme and students from BA Arts will still be able to pursue a postgraduate degree in Economics.


The mentorship programme will provide students a role model who can give encouragement and guidance.

Spotlight on Dr. Irene Mosca



Why did you choose Economics?

I thought that Economics was the perfect mix for me: I liked numbers and had an interest in public policy. Courses such as physics and chemistry did not interest me as much. I also thought that graduating in economics would open a lot of doors for me in the job market. For example, I could work in a financial institution, I could be a teacher or I could pursue a career in research. I have never regretted choosing economics.

What brought you to MU?

I moved to Ireland in 2010, after studying economics in Italy and the UK. I joined the Department of Economics in MU in 2019. It is a small but active, vibrant, skilful and cohesive department. I am very happy to be part of it.

Could you tell us a bit about your research?

My research is applied. I use large datasets and apply statistical methods to answer questions such as: are unemployed individuals more likely to be in poorer mental health? Are people who just retired more likely to volunteer than people who haven't retired as yet? Is there a link between health in childhood and economic success in adulthood?

What were the main challenges you faced in the pandemic as a lecturer?

The last year has been very challenging, for both students and lecturers. I did miss the human interactions with students and colleagues. I had to learn fast how to use technology in teaching. When schools and childcare facilities were closed, I had to juggle work and caring responsibilities. The silver lining is that we have all learnt how to think outside the box and deal with difficult situations. These skills will help us a lot in the years to come.
