Syllabus

<u>Aims</u>

To introduce participants in the module to aspects of the history of the medieval world. To survey the expansion of the Scandinavian people commonly known as 'Vikings' into Europe, east and west, and beyond, and to survey the expansion of the Normans from Normandy to the Mediterranean and elsewhere, including Britain and Ireland.

Objectives

To acquaint students with the various regions in which the Vikings and Normans were active, and with the sources that inform us about the period.

Learning Outcomes

Students should develop a sound knowledge of the Viking and Norman worlds and an appreciation of the value and limitations of the various sources.

Assessment

35% of the assessment for this module is based on a 90-minute examination at the end of the semester (in mid-January) and 65% is on the basis of continuous assessment (five assignments):

- 1. Footnotes and bibliography exercise (5%)
- 2. 500-word <u>summary</u> of a book chapter: Jan Bill, 'Ships and seamanship' in Peter Sawyer (ed.), *The Oxford illustrated history of the Vikings* (Oxford, 1997), pp 182–201. To be graded on key points and themes (5%)
- 3. 2,000-word essay on 'The Vikings in Ireland' or 'Vikings in the north Atlantic' (20%)
- 4. 1,500-word critical <u>review</u> of book chapters: Trevor Rowley, *The Normans* (Stroud, Gloucestershire, 2000), chs 1 & 2. To be graded on key points and themes, and on critical evaluation (15%)
- 5. 2,000-word essay on 'The Normans in England' <u>or</u> 'The sources for the history of the Normans' (20%)
