How might we create healthier cities and environments? How should we face up to problems of violence and inequality in our democracies? What is the role of art in communicating the place of wounds and healing qualities of place? From 14-20 October 2016, indigenous American and New Zealand, and Irish, Northern Irish, South American and South African artists, activists and scholars will explore these questions and exchange their practices. These experts share a common concern in addressing the painful histories of dispossession and will consider what it means to attend to places wounded by the legacies of historical violence. 'Mapping Spectral Traces: The Place of the Wound' will explore new ways of healing places and ourselves. Through workshops, talks, walks and exhibition, participants will 'map' displacement, inequality and and socialecological damage, and explore alternative spatial imaginaries tied to decolonisation, memorywork, care and spatial justice, the better to meet local-global challenges. 2:30-4: Gaitways: Moving Along the Corridors of Cultural Wounding, Movement Workshop, with Bernadette Divilly, independent dance and movement artist. Using simple gestures and ordinary everyday actions, participants will explore how we can locate ourselves by being aware of our own gait. Applying an understanding of the impact of trauma on the body and its somatic expressions, we will explore delight, resource and the power of connecting as routes in working with wounded places.

4:30-5pm: A Revolver in the Medical Bag, Performance Lecture by Michelle Browne, independent artist and curator, Sponsored by MU SSI. Exploring the training of women for both combat and first aid in the lead up to the 1916 Rising in Ireland, A Revolver in the Medical Bag looks at women's role in the 1916 Rising. Kathleen Lynn was the chief medical officer of the Irish Citizens Army and was also made captain. She gave first aid training to the members of the ICA and Cumman Na mBan and ran weapons in the lead up to the Rising. Helena Moloney who was also stationed at City Hall said 'it is part of our duty to knit and darn, but also to march and shoot, to obey orders in common with our brothers in arms'. Considering these too seeming opposites – training in care and war, destruction and repair – while considering the militancy of women both historically and in the present, the work explored how women take part in revolution and the lessons we can learn from 1916.

4-5:30pm: Keynote Panel Discussion: *Towards Spatial Justice*, chaired by Gerry Kearns, Maynooth Geography. The Earth is our Home. It is a home that we make with the rootedness of Place, the connections of Space, and the biophysical interdependencies of Environment. In some ways, and as we have spent the last three days examining, some people must live with Place as a Wound. Justice requires that we address the injuries that make our Earth a difficult place to make homely. These are injuries that impair even the best efforts to make fair and loving communities, that disable work for non-toxic and sustainable natures, and that cripple the solidarities that we must cultivate in face of our far-flung responsibilities. In these dangerous times, we must, as E.P. Thompson insisted, 'renew the raw nerve of outrage', even as we recognise that the way we mobilise now is the form and the promise of the future we need. Spatial Justice requires that we ask for and accept, that we project and offer, the assistance of distant strangers. To promote spatial justice means also that we make citizenship a claim against the injuries of poverty, ecocide, and patriarchy. These intimate injuries are among the wounds of place.
