Welcome to the fourth edition of the Department of Education Newsletter! It has been an inspiring period since our previous instalment, particularly with settling into our new home in the School of Education building with the Department of Adult and Community Education, the Froebel Department of Primary and Early Childhood Education and the Centre for Teaching and Learning. Living together under one roof has succeeded in bringing about the synergies we had hoped for across the continuum of education – and like all good relationships, our collaborations with them have made us a better and stronger Department.

As we lead up to the annual frenzy of examinations, it is important to take time to pause and reflect on what relationships across the sectors offer to how we think and practice education from the life perspective of students. The real challenge for us as educators is to create conditions so that each student from early childhood education through to university – no matter if they are a refugee, a Traveller, Irish, disabled, white, black or poor – can experience their self-worth and dignity as being central to their education. At second and third level, one wonders what effect our high stakes examination culture has upon our students? What messages do they receive about what is important in life and what role education plays in it? Do students feel supported in building a strong sense of themselves and their place in the world? These are the kinds of questions that have informed some of the activities you will read about in the following pages.

## The Enquiring Classroom

Professor Aislinn O'Donnell (Maynooth University) and Dr. Patricia Kieran (MIC) in collaboration with the Chester Beatty Library (CBL), and the Hunt Museum, Limerick are hosting a training school as part of their ERASMUS+ Project "The Enquiring Classroom".



This is a European project, partnering with Lovisa Bergdahl of Sodertorn University, Sweden and Stephanos Cherouvis of EA, Greece. This project aims to build a repository of learning and ideas for engaging children and young people in the discussion and exploration of ideas, religions, beliefs, values and 'big questions'. At the heart of the project is a commitment to dialogue, listening, imagination, and philosophical enquiry. We believe that educational spaces must be preserved as spaces of learning and understanding where students can speak freely, imagine, and explore questions, values and big ideas together, and where each person feels listened to, respected and valued. We are also interested in exploring moments of what we are calling 'stuckness and perplexity' and reflecting together on ways of navigating these.

In the Irish schooling context, this approach will have direct relevance to a range of subjects including the new Junior Cycle course in Philosophy and the new Leaving Certificate Subject, Politics and Society, and CSPE. But it will also be of interest to youth workers, people engaged in interfaith work, and people interested in engaging children and young people in philosophical enquiry. The aim is to explore ways of embedding this particular approach which has dialogue, imagination, philosophical enquiry and lived values at its heart, and to think of connections across the curriculum and in wider society.

Workshops will be held in the Chester Beatty Library, Dublin (**Saturday May 27th**), and in the Hunt Museum, Limerick (**Saturday May 13th**). There is also an online component of three 3-hour module inputs which will involve sharing ideas, practices, engaging in exercises and tasks, and deepening an understanding of the rationale for different approaches, for example, philosophical enquiry.

### BSc Science and Mathematics Education Class of 2017

The BSc.Ed. Class of 2017 will be the first graduates of the new five year course in Maynooth University School of Education next year.

They will progress from the BSc Science or Mathematics with Education into the second year of the Professional Master of Education (PME). The graduating science teachers will be qualified to teach junior science and two subjects from biology, chemistry, physics and mathematics. The mathematics education graduates will be qualified to teach maths, applied maths and computers.



### Action Research Café

The annual PME Year 1 Action Research Café was held in the School of Education on March 14th 2017.

The Action Research Café is designed around the concept of the World Café <http://www.theworldcafe.com/> and gives students the opportunity to share their work and insights with staff and students in the department.

During semester 1, each student chose a pedagogical area that s/he wanted to develop within his/her classroom. Using an action research approach, each one designed and implemented a plan for developing his/her capabilities in that area. 110 posters describing the results of the implementation were displayed at the Action Research Café. Colin Cooney (Lecturer, DkIT) and Silvan Comer (Second Level Teacher, Enniscorthy) joined the students for the morning and spoke about their experiences of using action research in their own teaching.



## Reconstructing Education through Mindful Attention

From 27-30 March 2017, the Department of Education had the pleasure of hosting **Dr. Oren Ergas**, senior lecturer at Beit Berl College, Israel, and author of the recently published '*Reconstructing 'Education' Through Mindful Attention: Positioning the Mind at the Center of Curriculum and Pedagogy*'.

Throughout his few days with us, Oren was kind enough to facilitate a workshop with our PME student teachers on mindfulness, as well as a session with staff and doctoral students on contemplative practices and pedagogies in higher education. Oren's visit culminated in a public lecture (sponsored by the Philosophy of Education Society of Great Britain), in which he explored the need for education to refocus its attention upon the mind in responding to the many challenges it faces today. For Oren, education is always a 'mind-making' endeavour: thus, the mind must always be considered in reflecting on what education entails and demands. It was fantastic to have Oren visit us, and we look forward to welcoming him back again in the future for more 'mindful' conversations!

## Global Teacher Award – PME Year 2 Workshop

The Global Teacher Award (GTA), held during the February mid-term break, was attended by around 20 PME Year 2 students.



The GTA is a validated teacher-education programme currently being made available across Ireland and in three EU partner-countries. It aims to raise the profile and quality of development education provision in the EU through the creation of a standardised development education training and award scheme for teachers.

In Maynooth, the programme builds on Year 1 Development Education provision for PME students. The workshop is led in Ireland by the Education Officer of the Galway One World Centre, Ms. Vicky Donnelly. This is the first time that Level 2 of the GTA has been delivered.

The workshop was a hands-on session which challenged student-teachers to allow their pupils to grapple with the main issues at the heart of development education. Feedback from the students taking part suggests that the workshop was a huge success and the students were keen to express their thanks and admiration of Vicky's creative, committed and deeply socially-engaged approach. They felt that her passionate engagement with issues of inequality, discrimination and injustice was an inspiration for them as they begin their careers.


One student, when asked how he found the GTA workshop, said the following:

## 3rd National Team Teaching Seminar in Maynooth

The third national team teaching seminar was co-hosted by the Department of Education Maynooth University (MU) and the Professional Development Service for Teachers (PDST) in Maynooth on Monday 13th February 2017.

The seminar marked the culmination of a research project involving Year 2 PME student teachers and experienced teachers in partner schools. Team teaching as an approach has been gaining prominence in post-primary schools in Ireland in recent years and is advocated in a range of policy documents from the Department of Education and Skills, the Inspectorate, the National Council for Special Education and the Teaching Council.

**The overall aim of the project was to facilitate the development of team teaching skills among student teachers and experienced teachers.** Approximately 150 participants engaged in a series of workshops on team teaching in autumn 2016 in Maynooth, Dublin, Navan and Carlow. These workshops introduced the concept of team teaching, explored the opportunities and challenges of working closely with a colleague and supported participants to engage in the planning and delivery of lessons taught in this way. Furthermore it offered a space for honest reflection based on team teaching experiences.

The national seminar was attended by close to 200 delegates, including student teachers, experienced teachers, principals and deputy principals, support services, policy makers and university representatives. Following the opening remarks by Prof. Sharon Todd (Head of the Department of Education MU) and PDST National Director Ms. Ciara O'Donnell, presentations throughout the afternoon provided a comprehensive picture of team teaching in post-primary schools. An overview of the project was presented on behalf of the team by Dr. Thomas Walsh (MU) and Ms. Phil Fox (PDST). Other team members integral to the project included Ms. Angela Rickard (MU), Ms. Rachel Farrell (PDST) and Ms. Edel Ní Arrachtaí (PDST), as well as a large number of PDST and MU staff who were present at the seminar. Insights from a team teaching partnership were provided by PME student Ms. Claire Cunnane and experienced teacher Mr. Michael Finnegan from Wilson's Hospital School, Multyfarnham. The centre piece of the seminar was a poster session with posters from over 60 student teachers and experienced teachers that distilled their key learning and insights gained from involvement in team teaching

activities. These provided an opportunity and stimulus for delegates to discuss their experiences, insights and concerns with colleagues and other professionals. The keynote address was given by Dr. Colette Murphy of Trinity College Dublin while Dr. Finn Ó Murchú (Mary Immaculate College) concluded the afternoon's presentations.

Data emerging from the research project to date indicate that the vast majority of experienced teachers who attended the workshops did not engage with team teaching during their initial teacher education nor have had an opportunity to engage in continuing professional development (CPD) around team teaching since qualifying. However, 82% of experienced teachers reported that team teaching was undertaken in their schools. Interestingly, 62% of the experienced teachers were involved in team teaching even though over 90% had never engaged in training/CPD around this approach. Participants' feedback on their experience of team teaching as part of the project was overwhelmingly positive. For example, 95% agreed or strongly agreed that it was a positive experience and 96% agreed or strongly agreed that the approach was beneficial for students. Moreover, 97% of participants agreed or strongly agreed that team teaching provided an opportunity to explore new methodologies in classrooms and 89% agreed or strongly agreed that it was an effective form of CPD. While 88% of participants believed team teaching should be introduced more widely in post-primary schools in Ireland, many also raised the challenges this would entail. These included the need for additional resources in terms of time and teachers; a clear national and school policy for team teaching as well as opportunities for CPD.

The projects presented evidence a very wide range of research interests from early childhood education, primary education, post-primary education as well more informal educational settings. The purpose of the presentations was to allow students to contextualise and communicate their research as they approached the completion of their projects. There was an opportunity on the evenings to speak about their research with staff and peers, to discuss the research of others and to reflect on the final steps to complete their research projects.

## €750k Awarded from HEA 'Programme for Access to Higher Education (PATH)' Fund

In seeking to widen participation within Initial Teacher Education, Maynooth University has been awarded a grant by the Higher Education Authority of €750,000 over three years.

The funding was announced at a press conference held by Minister Richard Bruton TD on April 17th. Our Department, in conjunction with the Froebel Department, the Department of Adult and Community Education and the Access Office proposed a 'Turn to Teaching' programme, which encourages increased diversity in the teaching profession through offering a range of educational innovations. The programme includes an 'Aspiring Teachers, Rising Leaders' programme targeting post-primary schools; a 'Think about Teaching' access course for mature students; a 'Tar linn ag Teagasc' support for students to learn Gaelige; and a 'Teaching for Tomorrow' part-time Professional Master of Education programme to be run by our Department. We are very proud to be part of making a real difference to Irish teacher education and the teaching profession more broadly speaking and will keep you posted on further developments!


## Education Society TeachMeet



## Collaborate to Design for Change

*"Unless someone like you cares a whole awful lot,

This year I was one of 29 BSc.Ed third year students who participated in a module called Collaborate to Design for Change. As part of the module, we participated in a Massive On-line Open Course (aka a MOOC). This was part of a European Project on collaborative learning called Co\_Lab <http://colab.eun.org> in partnership with the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment (NCCA). It was incredibly helpful and practical for use inside and outside the classroom. We learned about the collaboration rubric which had four questions. These allowed us to create collaborative lessons and evaluate the level of collaboration. We used this in our work in teams during our project and most of us have integrated it into our classroom practice. A large majority of us did find, however, that a wholly online course lacked human interaction which is the case of many MOOCs. We felt as though our learning was nurtured more with interactive, face-to-face learning, even if this happened to be on Monday at 9am!

The Design for Change(DfC) challenge was the second element of the module. DfC was started in India and has become a global movement <http://www.dfcworld.com>. Our projects were facilitated by Development Educator, Ms. Tara McGrath. We all agreed that this was an interesting, thought-provoking experience. It allowed us to think about issues of social injustice in developing countries, to appreciate how lucky we are and to recognise that we, as students and as teachers, can do something to help solve problems in many places. We all come from a Science/Maths background and so most of our projects were based around these subjects. Some teams used Physics to think of inexpensive ways to light roads and increase personal safety in Haiti; Chemistry was used to research women's health and to build awareness of the need for folic acid; while Maths was used to design Apps that can alert people to earthquakes. These are just some of the many amazing projects that the class group created in the 12-week module.

We used the FIDS framework that stands for Feel, Imagine, Do and Share. Students initially use 'feel' to put themselves in the shoes of people going through these tough times; they then use 'imagine' to think of the perfect solution regarding the issue; after this they 'do' something to try to work towards that perfect solution, even if it is only a tiny step; and finally they 'share' their idea with the world and try to make their theory and their project a reality. As student teachers, we would hope that by introducing this into the curriculum it would serve students not only as a curriculum-orientated project but also as part of the hidden curriculum as they learn empathy and are exposed to the reality of the world around them, outside their bubble. It can make students realise that issues need to be addressed and they are more than capable of thinking up incredible, creative solutions to these global problems.
