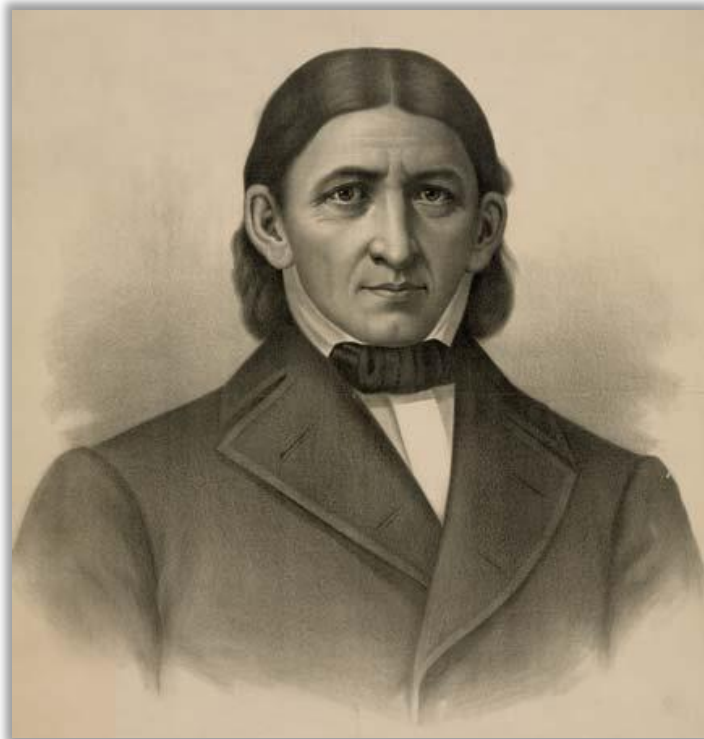

The feedback, particularly with regard to the high standard of the student presentations, was very positive. We look forward to them returning soon, hopefully, to continue their **studies at Master's Level...**



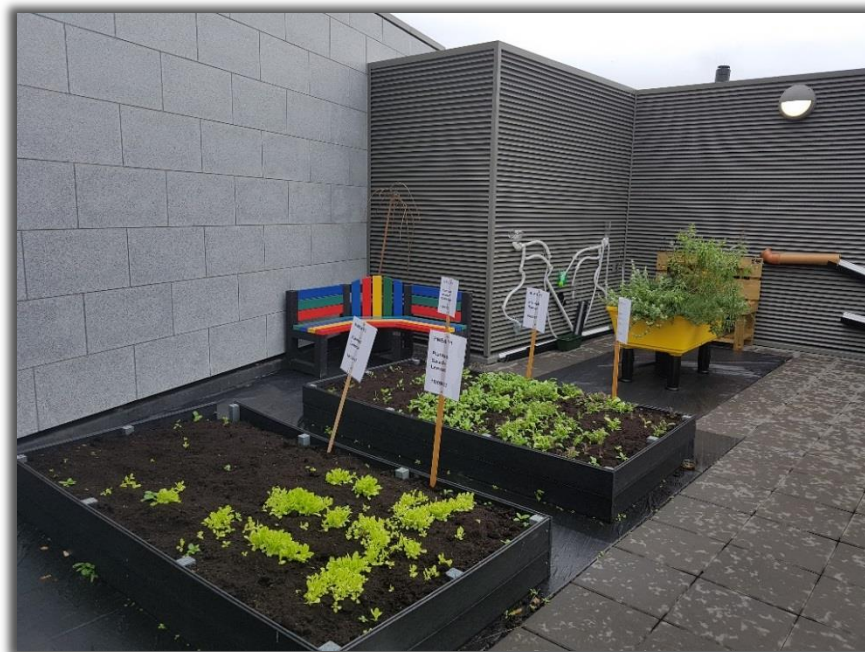

When confirmation of identity is secured, the information will be uploaded to the National Biodiversity Data Centre website as part of a national plan. The introductory session and tour of habitats, facilitated by Jim Carolan and with Dorena Bishop (Green Campus) and Gail Maher (Biology Dept.) in attendance, took place on Sept. 11th. Digital Learning in Europe

Séamie Ó Néill recently travelled to Odense in Denmark as part of the Erasmus+ project, Digital Learning in Europe. This Erasmus+ funded project aims to support the development, transfer and implementation of innovative ICT usage in primary schools, including national and transnational cooperation, peer-learning and the exchange of experience.



The project's thirteen partners are drawn from Denmark, Finland, Ireland and Italy, and consist of 10 primary schools and 3 universities. The Irish schools are St.Mark's SNS in Tallaght, Sacred Heart SNS in Killinarden and Lissivigeen National School in Killarney. Other Froebel Department staff members involved in the project include Tony Sweeney and Marie McLoughlin, along with Keith Young from the Department of Education.

Association for Teacher Education in Europe – the Dubrovnik Conference



The annual Association for Teacher Education in Europe (ATEE) Conference was held in Dubrovnik, Croatia between 23 and 25 October 2017. The conference theme was 'Changing perspectives and approaches in contemporary teaching'. Patsy Stafford and Eddie Costello co-presented on their project entitled 'Facilitating the development of prospective primary school teachers' understanding of the concept of ratio through discussion and everyday life contexts'.

Tony and Technological Adventures



As part of Science Week activities in Mary Immaculate College, Limerick, Tony Sweeney presented a workshop to Year 3 BEd (PE Specialism) students and invited local teachers from the Limerick area on Technology Adventures Outdoors. The session also featured a session exploring Maths and Science in Primary PE presented by Dr Rosemarie Martin. Students were **very actively engaged throughout the evening's presentation and activities!**

Drama in Norway!

Receipt of the staff mobility award facilitates an academic staff member to visit another educational institution amongst universities connected through established Erasmus exchange programmes. The purpose of a staff mobility visit is the exchange of practice and ideas in an academic area. During international week, 22-27 October 2017 recipient Dr Triona Stokes shared practice in drama education and participatory research methods in Bergen, Norway. The Western University of Applied Sciences scheduled three inputs during international week with three cohorts of staff and students. A seminar workshop was held initially, which investigated the use of participatory research methods exploring play in school-based settings. This was followed by a half-day workshop using popular music as a stimulus for a process-based approach to create school-based performance. The participants were predominantly BA Applied Theatre students with a small number of staff members. Finally, a play research network within the university composed of staff and students were the participant group of a seminar which investigated the use of participatory research methods with young children within the institutional setting of school.

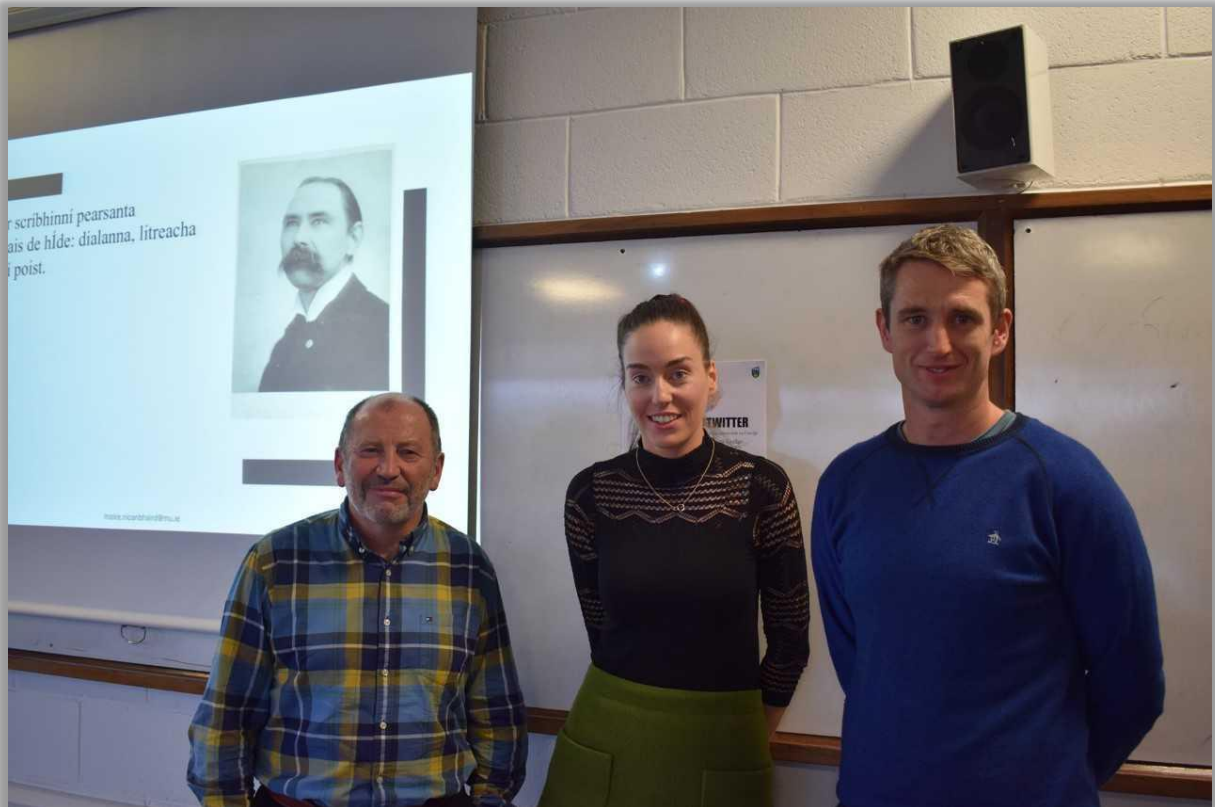
Early Years, Technology and Literacy

It explored digital literacy in both jurisdictions and evaluated the introduction and implementation of the use of I-Pads as part of the literacy strategy in both parts of the island of Ireland. This ongoing piece of research examines the requisite content, the most effective methodologies and characteristics of effective teachers of reading.

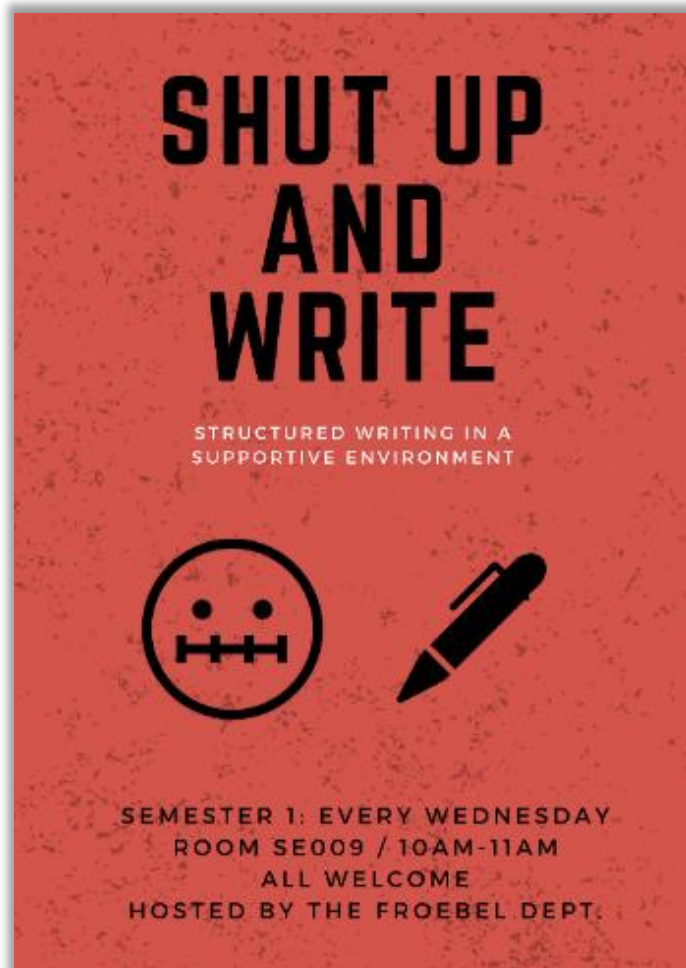
Results and conclusions from this research may have implications for future teacher educators with regard to reflection on their own instructional practice.

Student Campaign about Gaeltacht Fees

The following letter was written by students of the Froebel Department, outlining concerns about the Gaeltacht fees. It was published on the INTO website.

The matter of Gaeltacht fees is of utmost importance to us students studying to become a primary school teacher through the Bachelor of Education (B.Ed) and the Professional Master in Education (P.MEd) as the October Budget is fastly approaching.

In 2012, the Department of Education and Skills abolished the subsidy granted to all B.Ed and P.MEd students who are required by the Teaching Council to undergo two, two-week mandatory Gaeltacht courses. The cost to each student is €750 per course excluding transport costs, spending money, not to mention our loss of earnings for two weeks and for many the cessation of our part-time jobs.

We are urging the Government, to take immediate action and to reintroduce a subsidy to alleviate some of the increasing financial burdens that are placed upon us, as student teachers.

In our case, a small subsidy of €225,000 per year to the Gaeltacht course providers would sufficiently cover the annual cost to send 180 students from the Froebel Department of Early Childhood and Primary Education to take part in the Gaeltacht course. While this may be a small figure to our government, the reintroduction of this subsidy would be of huge support to us as student teachers.

If this unjust action of austerity by Enda Kenny's government was reversed, student teachers could focus on their learning and development of teaching skills rather than having to prioritise part-time work over our progression as student teachers.

Additional fees such as the cost of the Gaeltacht course act as a barrier to the diversification of the teaching profession. This fee indirectly discriminates against possible student teachers who would become role models for children of minority and/or poorer socio-economic backgrounds.

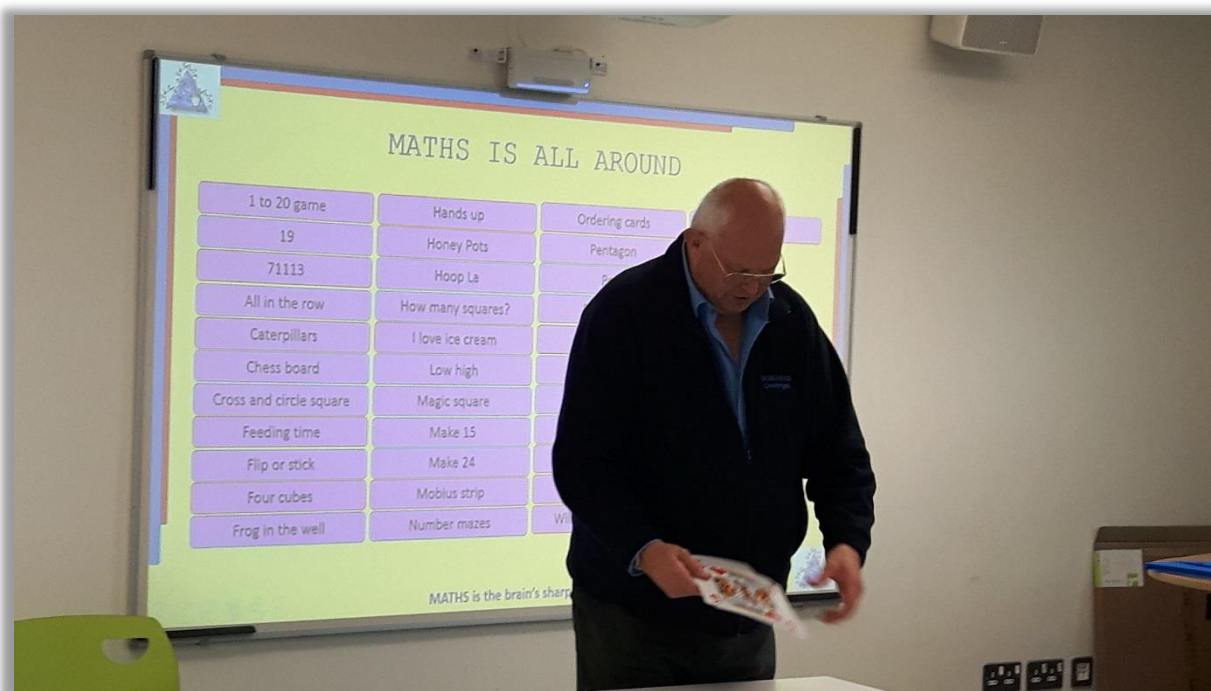

Pollination Plots



There are different patches of grassland around the campus which are allowed to grow wild as part of a national biodiversity plan within the University. There is a decrease in the bee population around the world and this plan allows for wildlife, including insects, birds and plants to grow and develop. There are multiple benefits to allowing the grassland to grow. Froebel students will be enabled to monitor the different areas, identify the different flowers and see who feeds of them and the changes that occur throughout the year. Six groups in each class will be in charge of a patch and monitor it every fortnight, taking into account the plants growing, the insects that it attracts and the birds that visit. Each group will show the other groups their findings of what, when and where they have identified within these habitats.

In the News....

The HEA has established the Programme for Access to Higher Education (PATH) fund to support initiatives that will progress the National Plan for Equity of Access to Higher Education 2015 – 2019. PATH 1 focused on access to initial teacher education. Maynooth University Access Programme, the Department of Adult and Community Education, the Department of Education and the Froebel Department of Primary and Early Childhood Education applied for funding under PATH 1. The proposal called *Turn to Teaching* aims to foster a culture among students from the target groups identified by the HEA including viz first time mature students, people from the Traveller Community, people with disabilities, lone parents etc., to consider the teaching profession as a desirable and achievable career option. The proposal was successful and resulted **in an allocation of €750,000 to implement it.** *Turn to Teaching* kicks off in November 2017. Katriona O Sullivan and Gareth Burns have been appointed to head up the project in collaboration with the various departments. Turn to Teaching will be formally launched in early Spring 2018.
