- Closing dates vary— usually from January onwards

Points System

- Your points are based on your most recent full year results so if <u>applying</u> in final year, you will be using your second year marks
- Points required varies each year points vary in each university and depending on your subjects
 - This is in response to a need to train teachers in shortage subjects
- It is not possible to predict points required for subsequent years



In addition to grades....How can I increase my points

- How can I increase my points?
 - If you don't get a place when you apply you can re-apple
 the following year with final year results
 - Additional Qualifications (only eligible if completed at time of application)
 - Undergraduate e.g. PLC courses / other quals
 - Postgraduate
 - Course must be completed by 1st December in year application
 - Relevant Paid Professional Experience 1 point for each year (full-time or part-time)

Good to keep options open and apply to several universities

The points system for academic performance set out below is designed to take account of all eligible level 8 primary degrees - including two-subject honours degrees, single honours degrees and degrees with one subject at honours level and one subject at pass level. In the case of eligible General Level 8 Degrees of the NUI (i.e. three subject pass degrees), points will be allocated using the schedule for pass papers.

The following should assist applicants who wish to calculate their points

The points for academic performances are based on the overall percentage mark obtained in the appropriate examination as confirmed by the applicant's university or awarding body, or as determined by The Postgraduate Applications Centre (PAC) on the basis of information received.

Maximum Points for candidates with an eligible level 8 primary degree for which an honours award is available: 51 points

Maximum Points for candidates with an eligible level 8 primary degree for which an honours award is not available: 45 points

Maximum Points for candidates with a two subject eligible level 8 degree, where honours are available for one subject but not for the other: 48 points

Qualifications which form a subsidiary part of a higher qualification are not awarded points and level 7 as part of a level 8 award e.g., a National Diploma as part of a Degree Programme.

All qualifications being submitted for assessment purposes must be awarded prior to 01 December 2018.



PAID Professional Experience

- Must provide documentation e.g.
 letter from employer
- Full-time /Part-time <u>paid</u> professional experience
 - In education
 - Working with young people
 - Related to teaching subject

Examples: In education / With young people

- Full-time Teaching in another country using your degree subject
- TEFL Teaching to groups
- Working full-time as a special needs assistant or classroom assistant
- Full-time employment as a sports coach, youth organiser or in a nursery/care setting with children

Related to teaching subject (normally at graduate level)

e.g., Employment as

- Accountant (Business Studies teacher) or Graduate level business related work experience
- Translator (Languages teachers)
- Laboratory Technician (Science teachers)

• 1 point awarded for each year of experience

Teaching Council: Registration

- For each teaching subject the Teaching Council have a list of requirements including the modules you must take as part of your degree.
- It is important to refer to this list when making your module selections.

Politics & Society

In order to meet the registration requirements set down in the Teaching Council (Registration) Regulations in respect of the curricular subject of Politics and Society, an applicant must meet <u>all</u> of the following criteria:

- (a) Applicants must hold a degree-level qualification, with Politics/Political Science or Sociology, or a combination of at least three of the following areas: Politics/Political Science, Sociology, Anthropology, Law, European Studies, Public Administration, Government, Development, Media Studies, Economics, History, Geography, International Relations or Philosophy comprising a minimum total of 60 ECTS credits or equivalent.
- (b) The qualifying degree must be equivalent to at least Level 8 on the National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ) and must carry at least 180 ECTS (European Credit Transfer System) credits (or equivalent).
- (c) Applicants must also have completed a post-primary initial teacher education (age range12-18 years) carrying a minimum of 120 ECTS credits (or equivalent).

What can you do now?

- The better your grades in 2nd year the higher your points when applying for the PME Post-Primary in final year
- Have a look at all of the courses links on our Info Sheets
- Check Teaching Council subject criteria and ensure your modules meet the criteria contact the Careers and Employability Service if you have any questions
- Check that you meet the course entry requirements
- If you don't talk to us / identify how you can get the missing requirements getting this sorted in 2nd year can remove stress in final year.
- Consider getting any relevant experience related to work with children/teaching etc. to gain additional points
 - Voluntary work also useful for TCD/UL/Hibernia
- Classroom observation, talking to teachers can be helpful in exploring whether teaching is as you
 expect it to be useful to get a sense of classroom environment now (rather than what you remember
 from school)

Primary Applications have 2 steps – Full Time Courses

(i) Irish Oral

- TEG B1 Oral Exam
- Must get at least 65% in this exam
- More details on TEG B1 here

- Can be useful to sit TEG B1 in 2nd year (you can then re-sit in final year if needed)

(ii) Course Application

- After getting 65% in TEG B1 you can apply for the course
- Applications usually close in March
- You must have all your results by July in the year you wish to start the course – August repeats mean you can apply the next year
- Applications are online
- You can apply to all 4 courses

How are places awarded?

Points system used by MU, DCU and Mary Immaculate College, Limerick

Points System

- Points are calculated based results from most recent completed year.
- If applying in final year your points are based on your results from the previous year (year abroad is not included)
- If applying after completing your degree, your points are calculated based on degree results.

Additional points can be claimed for

- Additional Qualifications (to be eligible must be awarded by 1st March in year of application)
 - ✓ Undergraduate
 - ✓ Postgraduate
- Relevant Paid/Unpaid Professional Experience
 - ✓ Related to work with young people/education/your degree subject

Additional Points – Professional Experience?

Points are awarded in three categories, where experience is deemed relevant:

Full-time paid professional experience.

One point is awarded per year of employment, up to a maximum of 5 points.

Part-time paid professional experience.

One point is awarded per year of employment (min. 100 hours per year), up to a maximum of 2 points.

Sustained voluntary work with young people (e.g., weekly) in an organisational context.

0.5 points is awarded per year of volunteering, up to a maximum of 2 points.

How are places awarded? Marino Institute of— Interview based

- Why people do not get places? Interview Performance / Knowledge of the teaching profession /
 - Not sufficient research into teaching
 - Spend time in a school if possible
 - Classroom observation
 - Talking with teachers
 - Becoming familiar with curriculum and current issues

What can you do now?

Irish

- Practice your Irish
- Not possible get a place on the full-time PME Primary course without 65% in TEG B1 Oral Exam
- Consider sitting the TEG exam in 2nd year so that you have it completed before final year
- Additional points awarded for higher marks in TEG exam
- Candidates who have passed higher levels of TEG (B2, C1 and C2) receive 10 additional marks.

Hibernia PME offer alternative Irish Oral as part of their interview process

Points

- Work hard in Second Year.
- The better your grades in your second-year exams, the better your chances of getting a place
- Consider your grades and your interests when choosing subjects
- Experience working with young people to gain additional points

^{*}Application procedure and/or use of interview in selection process may be subject to change in future years

Points for relevant Professional Experience

Up to five points may be awarded in recognition of full-time paid employment which is deemed relevant, and which can be verified. Points will normally be awarded on the basis of one point for year of relevant experience, up to the maximum of five points

Up to two additional points may be awarded in recognition of part-time paid employment which is deemed relevant, and which can be verified. Points will normally be awarded on the basis of one point for year of relevant experience, up to the maximum of two points

Applicants for the PME may have other relevant experience, independent of their academic programme(s), related to working with young people in a voluntary capacity. The experience must be over a sustained period and must be of a sufficiently high level to merit the allocation of additional points. In recognition of the value of these experiences, some additional points can be awarded. To claim additional points, you will normally need to provide a letter from an official of the organisation with whom you volunteered showing the start and end dates, your contribution in terms of time, and a description of the role.

Points are awarded in three categories:

- i. Full-time paid professional experience. If the experience is deemed relevant, one point is awarded per year of employment, up to a maximum of 5 points.
- ii. Part-time paid professional experience. If the experience is deemed relevant, one point is awarded per year of employment (min. 100 hours per year), up to a maximum of 2 points.
- iii. Sustained voluntary work with young people (e.g., weekly) in an organisational context. If the experience is deemed relevant, 1 point is awarded per year of volunteering, up to a maximum of 4 points.

Applicants may make a claim for points in any or all of these categories and may be awarded up to a maximum of 11 points in total.

Please note that:

- Points cannot be awarded where the supporting information provided is ambiguous or incomplete.
- The acceptance of points awarded for professional and voluntary experience is entirely at the discretion of the PAC PMEd team, representing the Froebel Department of Primary and Early Childhood Education, Maynooth University.
- 3. Points are not awarded for teaching in a school while unqualified.

Examples of relevant professional experience

	Normally accepted for points purposes	Not accepted
In education	Full time teaching in a school in another country. Working as a full-time special needs assistant. Working as a full-time classroom assistant. Full-time teaching in a HE or FE institute or in a centre of education as designated by the Education Act 1998. Teaching in a post-primary school as a qualified teacher.	Working in a non-contact role in a school, such as school caretaker. Working as an unqualified substitute teacher in a school. Paid internship which contributed to an academic qualification.
In working with young people	Verified full-time employment as a sports coach. Verified full-time employment as a youth organiser. Verified full-time employment as a social worker. Verified full-time employment in an early childhood setting. Verified full-time employment as a tutor in the arts (e.g., music, drama, dance).	Working as a personal trainer. Paid internship which contributed to an academic qualification.
In voluntary work with young people	Verified sustained volunteering as a sports coach, arts tutor, youth leader, etc.	Childminding or babysitting.

Note:

Full time employment is taken to mean full-time hours. Continuous employment for at least 9 months is required to claim points for one year.

Part time can be considered if either

- part time throughout the year (minimum 100 hours), or
- (ii) full time for a period of three months (e.g. summer employment).

Verification required for paid employment

- Letter from employer certifying the dates, nature of employment, and salary.
- A completed employer reference form (Blank form available through PAC).

Note: tax records may be requested as further verification of employment.

Verification required for voluntary work

Letter on headed notepaper from an official of the organisation with whom you volunteered.

What can you do now?

Prepare for interview* – school observation or talking to teachers...

Even if applying for courses without interview – observation will help you clarify if you would enjoy a classroom environment – gives you a good sense of what to expect


- Find out as much as you can about the primary curriculum
- How are subjects taught at different levels throughout the school?
- How are special educational needs supports provided in the schools?
- How are phonics taught? What is Aisteaír?
- Any recent/upcoming changes to the curriculum? ... Primary Languages curriculum? Well-being initiatives? Bi Cinnealta?
- Have a look at all of the courses.
- Check that you meet the entry requirements
- If you don't talk to us / identify how you can get the missing requirements getting this sorted in 2nd year can remove stress in final year.






