Maynooth University Awarded Athena SWAN Bronze Award for Work to Advance Gender Equality

Maynooth University has achieved the internationally recognised Athena SWAN Bronze Award for gender equality in higher education institutions



Athena SWAN accreditation is awarded by the Equality Charter Unit which works to support equality and diversity for staff and students in higher education institutions across Ireland and the UK.

Maynooth University is the first and only institution in Ireland to date to apply for and achieve the Athena SWAN Bronze award under the expanded version of the charter that includes Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences disciplines as well as STEM. The University is also the first Irish institution to incorporate intersectionality as part of its Athena SWAN application, taking into account the numerous factors than can overlap in discussions of inequality, including the intersections between gender, race and ethnicity.

University Honours Special Guests at 21st Birthday Summer Soirée

Maynooth University celebrated its 21st birthday as an institution by honouring some of Ireland's leading voices in arts and culture at a gala Summer Soirée and awards ceremony

The event, on 16 June, fell 21 years to the day that the Universities Act was signed, creating Ireland's newest university, independent from St Patrick's College, Maynooth, whose history dates to 1795.

The highlight of the evening was the presentation of two new sets of inaugural awards: The Maynooth University President's Medal and the Maynooth University Award for Arts and Culture.

This year's recipients were Oscar-nominated Irish film director Lenny Abrahamsom, who was presented with the 2018 Maynooth University President's Medal; acclaimed Northern Irish poet Michael Longley and 1996 Eurovision song contest winner and a graduate of Maynooth University, Eimear Quinn, both of whom were presented with the 2018 Maynooth University Award for Arts and Culture.

Maynooth Ranked 8oth in Top Young Universities in the World

Maynooth University has sustained its



place in the top 100 global universities under 50 years old, achieving a ranking of #80 in the latest Times Higher Education (THE) Young University Rankings

The Young University Rankings are based on a range of criteria, including number and quality of scholarly papers and citations research income achieved, reputation for research and teaching, numbers of PhDs awarded, the number and , and numbers of international staff and students.

Earlier this year, Maynooth University also was listed amongst the Top 200 institutions worldwide in the QS World University Rankings by Subject for two of its departments: English and Geography, both of which ranked in the 151-200 range.

Maynooth University President, Professor Philip Nolan, commented: "It has been just over 20 years since Maynooth University was established as an independent institution, and to be ranked amongst the Top 100 Young Universities, as well as having two of our departments make it to the Top 200 in the QS World University Rankings by Subject, is a real endorsement of the hard work, research impact, and exceptional teaching of our staff."

Director and screenwriter Lenny Abrahamson is well-known for his work on critically acclaimed independent films such as "Adam & Paul," "What Richard Did," and "Frank." In 2015, he received widespread praise for his film adaptation of the novel "Room," which led to his first Oscar nomination as Best Director.

Born in Belfast, poet Michael Longley, CBE, is recognised as one of Northern Ireland's foremost contemporary poets. With a literary career that spans decades, some of his best-known works, such as "Ceasefire" and "Wounds," offer emotive insights into life during The Troubles.

Holding an honours degree in music from Maynooth University, Eimear Quinn is one of the most celebrated Irish voices of her generation, fusing a genre of folk and classical, sacred and medieval. She won the Eurovision for Ireland in 1996 with her performance of "The Voice." Since then, Quinn has collaborated

with a number of international composers on a range of projects, and has performed in Australia, America and all over Europe in venues, including The Royal Albert Hall, The Sydney State Theatre and the Vorst National Brussels.

Maynooth University's Summer Soirée included a programme of performances and cutting-edge, interdisciplinary installations and lightning talks by Maynooth University lecturers, post-graduate students, and alumni.

Speaking at the event, Prof Nolan said: "Today at Maynooth, academics are reimagining how the public engages with the arts, by collaborating with colleagues across the sciences and social sciences to come up with new and innovative ways to understand and think about the world. That's something we tried to reflect with tonight's event, the spirit of youth and dynamism of Maynooth University at 21."

International Activists Tackle Inequality at 2018 World Community Development Conference

The theme of this year's conference is Participation, Power and Progress:
Community Development towards 2030 – Our Analysis, Our Actions

Poverty and marginalisation are deeply rooted and change will not happen overnight — but tangible results will be realised in time, with the right interventions, according to Anastasia Crickley, former head of the Department of Applied Social Studies at Maynooth University, speaking at the 2018 World Community Development Conference. Community development workers and activists from around the world converged on Maynooth University to share experiences and ideas, and highlight the importance of community development

in meeting global human rights standards and sustainability goals.

This first World Community Development Conference was jointly organised by the Department of Applied Social Studies at Maynooth University; Community Work Ireland, the national organisation for community work and the International Association for Community Development which has a membership throughout the world.

The conference took place at Maynooth University from 24 – 27 of June. 

Professor Linda Connolly, Director of the Maynooth University Social Sciences Institute and Chair of the Athena SWAN Self-Assessment Team that prepared the application, stated: "A comprehensive action plan and organisational analysis developed in the last year will now be fully implemented and will produce a range of progressive actions in the University, in the next three years."

The cornerstone of Maynooth University's Athena SWAN application is its comprehensive Gender Action Plan for 2018-2021, which is underpinned by the University's recently renewed Equality and Diversity Policy.

Geography Journal by Maynooth Professor Ranked First in Global Index

Academic journal *Dialogues in Human Geography*, founded by Professor Rob Kitchin, Department of Geography, has been awarded its first International Scientific Indexing (ISI) ranking



Still a relatively young journal, having been first published seven years ago, *Dialogues in Human Geography*, achieved the highest ISI citation impact of the 84 ranked Geography journals.

The ISI provides indexing of major international journals based on four key criteria: quality of publication (based on citations to its articles in other ISI ranked journals and the importance

and relevance for the research field), manuscript quality, presentational quality and editorial quality.

Commenting on the news of the journal's ISI ranking, Professor Rob Kitchin, founder and managing editor, said: "I'm delighted with this result. We have a hard-working team at the Journal, and it is great to have the quality of our content recognised in this fashion."

"Our goal with *Dialogues in Human Geography* is to stimulate open and critical debate on the philosophical, methodological and pedagogic foundations of geographic thought and praxis. The citation impact and ranking tells me we are achieving this goal."

Former Professor of Education Remembered

The entire community of Maynooth University was saddened to learn of the passing of John Coolahan, former Professor of Education at Maynooth University



Professor John Coolahan

John has been described as the "father of Irish education" for his vast contribution to education policy in Ireland over more than 40 years. At Maynooth University, he made an extraordinary contribution both to the discipline of education and the development of the University.

He authored the seminal books on the history of Irish education, and became a leading international voice on education policy. As Chairman of The Ark, John was a passionate advocate for the role of arts in education.

Maynooth University President Professor Philip Nolan said that with the passing of Professor Coolahan Ireland had "lost a giant in the world of Irish education."

Maynooth Academics Enrolled as Members of Royal Irish Academy

Professor Stephen Buckley, Department of Mathematics and Statistics, and Professor Gerry Kearns, Department of Geography, were admitted as members to the Royal Irish Academy (RIA)

They are among a group of 28 elected for their exceptional contribution to the sciences, humanities and social sciences, including the poet Eavan Boland; public servant, Martin Mansergh; geologist Koen Verbruggen; and educationalist Áine Hyland.

There are now 591 members of the Academy and 87 honorary members, in disciplines across the sciences, humanities and social sciences. Members of the Academy include President Michael D. Higgins, Baroness Nuala O'Loan, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Oxford Louise Richardson, and Nobel Laureate William C. Campbell.

Speaking on the announcement Maynooth University President, Professor Philip Nolan, said: "We at the University extend our sincere congratulations to our colleagues on this achievement. Membership of the Royal Irish Academy is a very significant honour for an academic, so I'm delighted to see them recognised in this way."

Professor Peter Kennedy, President of the Royal Irish Academy, said: "We should be proud of these new Members of the Academy for the honour their work brings to this country and the impact of this research on the quality of the higher education provided by our universities."

President Michael D. Higgins hosts special event celebrating the pursuit of peace and reconciliation

Hosted at the Presidential Residence in Phoenix Park, Dublin, the President Michael D. Higgins welcomed representatives from a number of organisations that have played an important role in the pursuit of peace and community reconciliation in Ireland.

The ICLRD is an umbrella organisation encompassing the National Institute for Regional and Spatial Analysis at Maynooth University, the Belfast School of Architecture and the Built Environment at Ulster University, and the Institute for International Urban Development in Cambridge, Massachusetts, USA.

The Centre's aim is to explore and expand the contribution that planning and the development of physical, social and economic infrastructures can make to improving the lives of people in both Irish jurisdictions and thus to peace-building and reconciliation on the island.

The ICLRD provides independent research, planning analysis and input from a range of international experts to assist policymakers, practitioners, local officials and community groups across Ireland in promoting good local and regional planning as part of the process of conflict resolution.

Prof Colin Graham's Inaugural Lecture 'Just Auden's Silly Yeats'

Inaugural Professorial lecture on 14 May explores the relationship between Auden and Yeats' work

W.H Auden's poetry is often compared with the work of figures like T.S Eliot and Ezra Pound, but the voice and the influence of Irish literary giant W.B Yeats is evident in some of his most iconic prose – even though Auden refers to Yeats as 'silly,' according to Professor Colin Graham, Head of English at Maynooth University.

In looking at the relationship between Auden and Yeats's work, it is impossible to ignore Auden's poem 'In Memory of W.B Yeats.' It is in this poem where he refers to Yeats as being "silly", but more importantly, "silly like us".

Prof Graham says: "When he uses the word 'silly' about Yeats, Auden is not just dismissing Yeats. He is referencing his role as a complex, almost paternal, figure that in some ways Auden rejects, but also recognises as someone that tried to comprehend the patterns of history via the language of politics and the private self – navigating all the ambiguities and 'silliness' that this entails. If Auden's Yeats is silly, he is silly like Auden. He is silly to try to contain and comprehend history."

Students, academics and professionals from 13 Higher Education Intitutes in Ireland and Europe will go to 33 leading U.S. institutions to study and collaborate with experts in their fields. This year's Fulbright recipients are from diverse disciplines spanning science, languages, technology, medicine, literature and the arts.

Dr Tanya M Cassidy is an affiliated senior researcher with the Department of Anthropology at Maynooth University, and a Visiting Fellow at the University of Central Lancashire in the Maternal and Child Nutrition and Nurture unit, where she held her EU Horizon 2020 Marie Skłodowska Curie Award. As a Fulbright-HRB Health Impact Scholar, she will extend her ethnographic research on the potentiality of mothers' milk, borders and bioscience, at the Department of Anthropology in the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Professor Mary P Corcoran is Head of the Department of Sociology and Associate Dean of the Faculty of Social Science at Maynooth University. As a Fulbright-EPA scholar she will undertake research on how civil society groups in partnership with municipalities act as "change agents" to promote environmental stewardship and sustainability. Professor Corcoran will be based at the Great Hunger Institute, Quinnipiac University.

The Fulbright Programme in Ireland has been a key driver in cross-atlantic collaborative research for over 60 years.

Evidence of Migrant Segregation in Primary Schools in Ireland

The annual Conference of Irish Geographers was recently hosted in Maynooth

Parents' choice of school for their child can lead to poor outcomes for some migrant groups, according to new research by NUIG's Dr Valerie Ledwith. "Putting parental choice at the centre of school attendance policy supports a system of education that allows the segregation of children at school," stated Dr Ledwith. Her work was presented as part of the 50th annual Conference of Irish Geographers, one of the largest ever gatherings of professional and academic geographers in Ireland.

More than 200 speakers travelling from 16 different countries presented their work in Maynooth, including Prof Ayona Datta, Reader in Urban Futures at King's College London, one of three keynote speakers. Geographers showcased their work on such diverse topics as abortion rights, climate change adaptation, housing policies, energy efficiency and the new National Planning framework.

Speaking at the event on campus on 31 May, Donnery argued that the case in favour of setting a positive Countercyclical Capital Buffer sufficiently early in the economic cycle, to build in resilience and mitigate procyclicality in a downturn, is compelling. The

Deputy Governor lectured in economics at Maynooth University before joining the Central Bank of Ireland.

Her talk was followed by a panel discussion with alumnus, Dr Robert Kelly, Central Bank Head of Macro-Finance Division; alumnus Dermot O'Leary, Chief Economist at Goodbody Stockbrokers, and Professor Gregory Connor, Maynooth University.

Maths Circles and Junior Maths Enrichment at Maynooth University

This year the Department of Mathematics and Statistics ran Maths Circles and Junior Maths Enrichment sessions on campus

The sessions were open to 5th and 6th class primary students and 1st, 2nd and 3rd year secondary school students. The aim of these initiatives is to provide an open a creative environment for students to explore mathematical topics and investigate new ideas. The material covered in the sessions often would not be approached by students until Leaving Certificate, but was delivered through games and activities, making it accessible to all. During this semester more than 100 students attended each week.

Tutors also went to a number of DEIS schools to deliver sessions, as the students would not have the means to travel to Maynooth. There was a positive response from students, parents and teachers. In feedback at the end of the year, when asked what was the most important thing learned in the sessions, one student replied "maths actually does involve fun." The Department of Mathematics and Statistics plans to run the initiative again next year, reaching out to ever more students and schools.

Conference on "The Rebirth of Marxism: Haunting the Future?"

More than 200 scholars, students, community and civil society activists from 18 countries attended the conference celebrating Karl Marx's 200th birthday

Keynote speakers were Italian political philosopher Antonio Negri, chaired by Dr David Landy at TCD, and U.S. theorist Professor Jodi Dean, chaired by Dr Conor McCarthy, Dept of English.

The international conference explored Marx and Engels' contributions to analysis and political practice, how their life and work helped shape history and culture around the world, the many different strands and meanings of "Marxism," and how we can understand their legacy and ongoing relevance today.

The event was supported by the Depts of Anthropology, English, Geography, Philosophy and Sociology; the Dean of Social Sciences; the Commemoration Committee; the Conference and Workshop Fund; and the Sociological Association of Ireland.

Maynooth Scientists publish in *Beilstein Journal of Organic Chemistry*

The Stephens' group at the Department of Chemistry have published an article entitled "Elegant Synthesis of Pyrazolopyrimdinones" in the *Beilstein Journal of Organic Chemistry*

The pyrazolopyrimidinone is of interest due its role as a basic core scaffold in many pharmaceutically relevant compounds and has found use in the battle against several illnesses including cancer, viral afflictions, obesity, and cystic fibrosis. Strategies for the synthesis of compounds of value, such as the pyrazolopyrimidinones, is a major focus for many synthetic chemists. This publication by the Stephens' group describes a facile method for the one-

pot microwave assisted synthesis of substituted pyrazolopyrimidinones, with a variety of functional groups tolerated.

Euclid's Elements on Display in the Russell Library

'Reading Euclid: Examining the key mathematical text through an exhibition at the Russell Library' is a collaboration between Maynooth University, St Patrick's College, Maynooth and the University of Oxford.

The exhibition, curated by Dr Ciarán Mac an Bhaird, Department of Mathematics and Statistics, and Barbara McCormack, Special Collections Librarian, offers insights into how this important mathematical text was used by readers for mathematical instruction, or to advance mathematical understanding.

The exhibition of pre-1700 texts, which will run until the end of July, is part of "Reading Euclid: Euclid's Elements of Geometry in Early Modern Britain and Ireland." Dr Beeley, member of the Reading Euclid project team, will discuss the discoveries made while studying these texts, such as notation, which sheds some light on how these books were used.
