Maynooth Scientist leads €6.3M SFI/Industry Project in Drone Operations Research

Research based out of Maynooth University exploring practical uses for drone technology is awarded €6.3m from Science Foundation Ireland and industry investment

Minister of State for Training, Skills, Innovation, Research and Development, John Halligan, TD, recently announced funding from Science Foundation Ireland (SFI) of \in 1.8m - with a further \in 4.5m investment from industry (cash and in-kind) to Dr Tim McCarthy, Department of Computer Science and National Centre for Geocomputation, for a new drone technology initiative known as U-Flyte.

U-Flyte is an SFI Strategic Research Partnership award based at Maynooth University that involves collaboration with partners across the aviation industry, and includes input from Airbus, Irelandia Aviation, Intel and 15 other relevant companies and agencies, with an active interest in the development and deployment of drone technology.

Maynooth University Psychology Professor Awarded RIA Gold Medal

The award recognises his outstanding contribution to the Social Sciences, and in particular, his research into how psychological, social and technological factors can be used to make society more accessible for all, especially to people with disabilities.

Royal Irish Academy (RIA) Gold Medals are awarded to two outstanding academics each year, and are recognised as a truly national celebration of scholarly achievement. The medals are sponsored by the Higher Education Authority.

The RIA Gold Medal is a testament to a lifetime of passionate commitment to the highest standards in scholarship and is a well-deserved recognition of scientific excellence.

Mac MacLachlan is Professor of Psychology and Social Inclusion and Director of the ALL Institute (Assisting Living & Learning) at Maynooth University. He is also Research & Innovation Lead for WHO's Global Collaboration on Assistive Technology programme, and Knowledge Management Lead for the United Nations' Partnership for the Rights of Persons with Disabilities.

He has worked as an academic, clinician, organisational consultant and policy adviser in Europe, Asia, Africa and South America; with national government and United Nation agencies, as well as in the private sector.

President of Maynooth University, Professor Philip Nolan, commented: "Professor MacLachlan's research on how psychosocial factors and technology can be used to help marginalised people 'break into' society is exemplary, and has the potential to affect people's lives in a very tangible way."

Professor MacLachlan said: "Receiving the Gold Medal from the Royal Irish Academy is an honour, and it means a lot to have our research recognised in this way. We will continue to build on this research, in collaboration with partners from government, civil society, corporates and United Nations agencies, in Ireland and internationally, with the intension of making clear and tangible differences to people's lives."

This is the second RIA Gold Medal for a Maynooth University professor. In 2013 Maynooth University Geographer, Professor Rob Kitchin, was presented with the Royal Irish Academy Gold Medal in recognition of his outstanding contribution to the Social Sciences through his research into spatial science and its potential impact on society and public policy. Professors MacLachlan and Kitchen are the only two Gold Medallists in the Social Sciences employed in a university in the Republic of Ireland.

Maynooth University Grows Share of CAO First Preference Applications

Maynooth University has grown its share of CAO first preference applications with more than 3,360 students selecting Maynooth as their university of choice for the 2018-19 academic year

Maynooth's growth comes at a time when overall CAO application figures have declined. This speaks to the success of Maynooth's undergraduate curriculum, which offers students a level of flexibility in when they choose to specialise, first-year critical skills modules, and opportunities to study across disciplines that are unique among Irish universities.

The latest CAO figures reveal increased interest in Maynooth University courses across all major fields, with a 33% increase in the number of first preference

applications for Law, 27% for Science and Maths Education, and 22% for Primary Education.

Commenting on the figures President Philip Nolan said: "Maynooth University has marked 20 years since its foundation in 1997, and this is another significant milestone for the University. Maynooth University has tremendous momentum as an institution, and our success allows us to continue to attract world-class researchers and highly motivated students to the University into the future."

Maynooth University to Build New Student Centre

Maynooth University and Maynooth Students' Union (MSU) have appointed a design team to begin work on a new Student Centre to serve as the hub for student life on the campus

The new building is part of the next phase of Maynooth University's campus development plan, which is aimed at providing the critically important campus buildings and infrastructure needed to meet the changing needs of students, staff and the wider community.

The new Student Centre will serve as a home-fromhome for students and a focal point for student life. The new building will open in early 2021 and serve as a hub for MSU, clubs, societies, events, and a variety of activities that help to create that special sense of belonging that is so important to the Maynooth student experience.



Designed by Scott Tallon Walker Architects—who also designed the University's Library, lontas and School of Education buildings—the new Student Centre's distinctive architecture will create an iconic destination on campus that is welcoming, vibrant, friendly and inclusive. The Student Centre will be built and operated to the highest sustainability standards, including an innovative 'outdoor living room' under a sustainable canopy, blurring the distinction between indoor and outdoor space and creating a unique space and resource for student life.

Project in Drone Operations Research (continued)

The aim of U-Flyte is to tackle the current global log-jam impeding the wider development of drone operation and the roll-out of commercial services by providing the necessary research, data and case studies to guide agencies and industry in allowing drones to safely fly further and higher than the current limits.

The programme will see researchers recreate flying environments for drones as digital models, taking into account a wide range of factors like air traffic, buildings and electricity lines, and then testing them in the real world at Waterford Airport and other selected locations around Ireland.

Dr Tim McCarthy said: "U-Flyte is going to play a vital role in helping the development of drone applications, as well as give us essential data, which in turn, will contribute greatly to how we teach artificial intelligence (AI), robotics and data science at Maynooth. The input from our industry stakeholders means we will have access to real-life scenarios and challenges, ensuring more robust modelling and useful applications."

Professor Philip Nolan, President of Maynooth University said: "the launch of U-Flyte serves to underline Maynooth University's position as a scientific leader in an industry that is at the forefront of research and innovation. We believe Maynooth University is uniquely positioned to carry out what is truly future-setting research because of the strong relationships with our industry partners and the interdisciplinary research strengths we bring to bear on an issue as multi-faceted and complex as the future of drone operations."

State-of-the Art Preservation Facility IFI Irish Film Archive @ Maynooth University Opens

The IFI Irish Film Archive @ Maynooth University, a new purpose-built moving image preservation facility at Maynooth University, was launched on 9 March by Josepha Madigan, TD, Minister of Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht

The largest facility of its kind in Ireland, it triples the IFI Irish Film Archive's current storage capacity, thereby ensuring the preservation of Ireland's national film heritage for generations to come.

In November 2011, the IFI officially launched the IFI Irish Film Archive Preservation Fund after its archive building in Temple Bar reached capacity. Through this innovative partnership with Maynooth University, and support from the Department of Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht; Maynooth University; the Irish Film Board; and the Broadcasting Authority of Ireland; the IFI Irish Film Archive @ Maynooth University has come to fruition. Measuring 180 sq m, the facility contains 120 sq m of climate-controlled vault space to help house part of the IFI Irish Film Archive's collection of 30,000 cans of film dating from 1897. Speaking at the opening of the facility, the Minister for Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht Josepha Madigan TD said: "This archive is a treasure trove which

Screening of "Condemned to Remember"

The film follows Irish Holocaust survivor Tomi Reichental as he embarks on an epic journey across a Europe in turmoil, and relives the horrors of the Second World War, over seventy years after his liberation from Bergen Belsen Concentration Camp. In the words of Tomi: "I am condemned to remember the terrors of the past and compelled to resist the return of the evil that turned Europe into a wasteland."

The film demonstrates a strong connection with what is happening in Europe currently, refugees fleeing war torn Syria, nationalism and right wing movements and the parallels in the mass murder of more than 8,000 Muslim men and boys in Srebrenica in 1995. Tomi continues: "We are all possible victims, possible perpetrators, possible bystanders."

The strong themes of the film point to injustice and human rights, and that such injustices must not be let continue. The film was followed by an engaging panel discussion with Tomi Reichental and Shaykh Dr Umar Al –Qadri, along with Dieke Potzel, Ambassador of the Federal Republic of Germany in Dublin; Gerry Gregg, Director of the film; and Peter Cassells, Executive Director of the Kennedy Institute.

Citizens' Dialogue on the Future of Europe at Maynooth University

The February event, which normally focuses on EU job opportunities for students, this year included an interactive panel discussion with the Irish and French Ministers of European Affairs and Maynooth students. Prof John O'Brennan moderated at the event with some of the 300 students in the audience participating on this topical discussion.

Speaking in advance of the dialogue, Minister McEntee said: "It is vital that Ireland brings its influence to bear on the future direction of the European Union. The EU is not perfect and responding to the needs and concerns of our citizens should be a priority. The EU must, therefore, look to its citizens for guidance to hear from them what they want from the EU and how they want it to work better for them."

Joint INTO-Froebel Seminar on School Placement

A seminar on School Placement, organised jointly by the INTO and Maynooth University Froebel Department of Primary and Early Childhood Education, took place on Saturday 14 April

The purpose of the seminar was to discuss experiences of school placement and to consider the opportunities and challenges from the perspective of principals, teachers, students and tutors. INTO recently conducted a survey on the subject of school placement with teachers and principals, randomly selected from their membership database. Findings from this research were presented at the seminar, along with research on the student experience of placement. The keynote presentation by Amanda Corrigan from the University of Strathclyde outlined the Scottish perspective on the policy and practice of student teacher school experience. It is anticipated that the seminar will inform policy and help to address the current challenges of school placement.

Energy Pods in the Library

In March 2018, the Library introduced a new and innovative service for students



Energy Pods allow students to take a 20-minute nap in the Library, recharging their batteries before they return to their studies refreshed. The Maynooth University Library is the only one in Ireland to have this kind of facility. The introduction of the pods generated great interest in national media.

In 2017, in collaboration with the Maynooth Students Union (MSU), the Library ran a competition called 'If students did libraries...' Students were invited to submit ideas for improving the library service. Seven entries were invited to participate in a 'Dragons' Den' style final where they pitched their ideas to a panel of judges that included senior members of library staff, the MSU President, the Dean of Teaching & Learning, and the Director of the National Library of Ireland.The winner was Brian Crinnion, a first year robotics student, who told the panel of judges about his personal experience commuting a long distance to campus and attending challenging lecturers. Brian presented research showing the restorative benefits of a 20-minute nap compared to a caffeine drink. Brian's idea of Energy Pods in the Library appealed to the judges as it provided a solution for students who travel long distances to campus.

Library users now have access to over 30,000 additional ebooks, published by Cambridge University Press, until the end of this semester. They cover all subject areas and can be read online, anytime, anywhere.

Great Start to Year for the Maynooth University Golfers Ronan Mullarney won the R&A Foundation Scholar's Tournament at the home of golf in St.

Andrews, Scotland on 3 March

Ronan led from start to finish posting impressive rounds of 67, 71, and 70 for a total of 208 (-4) to win by four strokes in very testing conditions over the two day event. Maynooth University have had back-to-back winners of the event following Stuart Grehan's victory in 2017.

As a result of the victory, Ronan will now gain an automatic place on the International team to face the USA in the Arnold Palmer Cup which comprises the top collegiate worldwide. The event is being played at the Evian Resort in France from July 6 - 8. Ronan becomes the third Maynooth University golf scholar to play in the Arnold Palmer Cup following in the footsteps of Stuart Grehan (2016 & 2017) and Gary Hurley (2013 & 2015).
